

- A Resilient Wales where we protect and enhance nature and biodiversity.
- A Healthier Wales where everyone is healthier and are able to see the doctor when they need to
- A More Equal Wales where everyone has an equal chance whatever their background
- A Wales of Cohesive Communities where Communities can live happily together
- A Wales of Vibrant Culture and Thriving Welsh Language where we have lots of opportunities to do different things and where lots of people can speak Welsh
- A Globally Responsible Wales where we think about how our actions have an impact on other people and places around the World.

Learning Outcomes


We are learning to:

- State what a connected community is, and what the benefits are for its citizens.
- Name some of the different jobs that are involved in developing communities
- Work together on different sections of the Masterplan for a future city, to imagine ourselves in different urban planning roles.

Materials/ Resources Required

- 'Planning fit for the future' PowerPoint presentation
- Printouts of the Masterplan
- Future Community Master Planners Sheets
- The Megan Video (an introduction to the Well-being of Future Generations Act.

We've included the below information in the relevant 'speaker notes' section on the PowerPoint presentation.



Slide 1

• Explain to the class that you they are going to be helping the Future Generations Commissioner for Wales.

Slide 2


• Explain to the class that they are going to be discussing 'planning for the future'

Slide 3

• Explain to the class that you wish them to be creative and collaborative



- Show the Megan Video
- Ask the class for their observations



Slide 5

- Introduce the 7 Well-being goals again
- You can find 'child friendlier' definitions on page 3



- · Introduce the 4 dimensions of sustainable development
- · Explain that they are all important when we make decisions

Slide 7

Ask the class the following questions:

- What does the phrase 'connected community' mean to you?
- How do people connect with one another?
- When and where do people connect in your community?
- What is good about being connected?
- Do you think a connected community helps people understand each other?
- How could we work together in our community to help people understand each other?
- What can help your well-being in your community?
- Explain that a connected community is a place where people can easily come together to access technology, art and culture, share ideas, enjoy outdoor spaces and work together.

Benefits of a connected community to its citizens include:

- It will inspire people to share ideas and create
- It will be easy to get around by transport
- It will encourage citizens to be curious and involved
- It will help them to have a good balance between living, working and playing, by making it easy to get from work to home or leisure activities.

Slide 8

Allow for the groups to feed back and discuss what they like about their communities, and write this on flip chart or a white board. Specific examples are welcomed.

Slide 9

Allow for the groups to feed back and discuss what they would like to improve about their communities, and write this on flip chart or a white board. Specific examples are welcomed.

Slide 10

Intro to the main activity

- Explain that when a community is being designed, the main design document is called a masterplan.
- A masterplan details what a city will be like in the future, so it becomes a better place to live and work. The masterplan shows details about all aspects of community life, like transport, housing, health, education, business and industrial use, green and public spaces.
- Explain that a lot of decision making about different areas of a community is called urban planning.

Slide 11

- This slide is aimed at making the pupils understand that the world is changing
- Explain that it is therefore important for us to plan for changes like these

Slide 12-18

- These slides show the evolution of innovation and creativity
- Explain that each idea (house) is different and that a lot of planning is required
- The home above the water is designed to fly as a holiday home using a drone
- The home under the water is designed to follow the sun or specific climates

Slide 19-22

- The class is tasked with being urban planners
- They will take on different roles as teams. We suggest you hand out the team one pagers (pages 12 15) to the relevant teams.
- Environmental specialists understand how to protect the environment, and use their skills to advise other urban planners about how to protect wildlife and nature.
- Transport committees make sure the community is well-connected for its citizens, with good roads and reliable public transport as well as public walkways and cycle paths. The team also must consider the impact of transport on the environment.
- Well-being and Happiness teamsmake sure its citizens will have access to spaces and facilities that will promote healthy and happy lives, using research from scientists.
- Education experts help architects think about how buildings and spaces will be good for learning. They also help shape our ideas about the future and create learning activities and resources to challenge us and change how we think.

Environmental Specialists



Environmental specialists know how to protect the environment. They use their skills to advise on how to protect wildlife and nature, and how to help residents enjoy green and natural community spaces.

- Consider what parks and green spaces you would include .
- Work together to design a small park or natural city space.
- Make sure your design includes areas and facilities for:
- Healthy living and exercise
- Cool, shaded areas
- Wildlife and plant life
- How could your park be 'smart' (use of technology) and connect to the city to share information, protect the environment and make it a better place for people?

Transport Committee



The transport committee makes sure the community has the right connections for its citizens, with good public transport, public walkways and cycle paths. It thinks about the impact of transport on the environment and encourages residents to use more sustainable ways to get from place to place.

- Think about how residents could easily travel between places.
- Plan some sustainable ways to travel between places
- What initiatives and incentives could you create to allow people to access sustainable transport?

Well-being &

Team



Well-being & Happiness is an important part of creating a community The Wellbeing & Happiness team uses research from experts to design spaces and facilities that help every resident to live a healthy and happy life.

- Think about all the things that can help residents to be happy and healthy citizens.
- Remember to think about the needs of children, families, young and working people.
- Design a poster that shows what facilities and activities you would provide. You can think of all residents or focus on one group. You might want to think about:
- Active living
- Healthy eating
- Inclusive communities
- Relaxation and entertainment

Education Experts




Education experts help shape our ideas about the future. They create ways of learning to challenge us and change how we think.

- What activities could excite young people about the future and help them to think in new ways?
- What would a future school look like?
- How can it be more sustainable?
- How could it achieve all 7 of the National Well-being Goals?
