"A nation which maintains and enhances a biodiverse natural environment with healthy functioning ecosystems that support social, economic and ecological resilience and the capacity to adapt to change".

5: Using Natural Resources

Defining the goal

Here in Wales, we are now among the most nature-depleted countries in the world, with 1 in 14 wildlife species facing extinction.

Wales also has some of the worst air quality in the UK, still emits high numbers is greenhouse gas emissions and are now at greater risk of flooding, soil erosion and poorer water quality. Without healthy functioning ecosystems, we cannot resist, recover from or adapt to the changes facing our planet.

Our natural environment here in Wales is vital for our well-being; it provides the air we breathe, our food, 951 million litres of drinking water per day, our clothes, medicine, materials such as timber, as well as green spaces to enjoy. However, we are living in an area of unprecedented change when it comes to our planet. Biodiversity, 'the variety of all life on earth', has seen an overall 60% decline in species across the globe since 1970. The goal of a resilient Wales is to reverse the decline of our biodiverse natural environment, to develop better awareness of our impacts as individuals and organisations, to ensure we are ecologically resilient, with healthy ecosystems, and to support community well-being.

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Other statutory requirements in relation to this goal

The Environment (Wales) Act 2016 introduces the Sustainable Management of Natural Resources (SMNR) and sets out an approach to planning and managing natural resources to ensure that the benefits they provide for our social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing are available now and for future generations.

The Natural Resources Policy sets out national priorities for the sustainable management of natural resources, for us all to contribute towards. The priorities are about mainstreaming action for biodiversity across our urban and rural areas and reducing the pressures on our natural resources.

Natural Resources Wales' area statements

will be developed by 2020. They help deliver the priorities in the Natural Resources Policy in a place, and will be a valuable tool to support public bodies and others delivering local actions.

Section 6 under Part 1 introduced an enhanced biodiversity and resilience of ecosystems duty (the S6 duty) for public authorities (which includes public bodies in the WFG Act) in the exercise of functions in relation to Wales. More details can be found in the <u>Welsh</u> <u>Government Essentials Guide</u>.

The <u>State of Natural Resources Report</u> (SoNaRR) sets out the national evidence base on the resilience of ecosystems in Wales so that we can understand the extent to which sustainable management of natural resources is being achieved. The building blocks of ecosystem resilience are – Diversity, Extent, Condition, Connectivity and Adaptability. **Planning Policy Wales** plays a significant contribution to the improvement of well-being in all its aspects and embeds the spirit of the Well-being of Future Generations Act, through moving us towards a low carbon, resilient society with well-connected environments for everyone in Wales. The planning system can contribute to improving the resilience of ecosystems and ecological networks, halting and reversing the loss of biodiversity, maintaining and enhancing green infrastructure, ensuring resilient choices for infrastructure and built development, moving towards a more circular economy in Wales; and facilitating decarbonisation.

Enablers

Achieving this goal is **more likely to happen** when...

- There is urgent action at a pace and scale needed to combat the loss of biodiversity.
- Events and campaigns raise public awareness (e.g. Blue Planet 2 series) that can 'bring the topic to the political table'.
- It is recognised that Green Infrastructure (GI) is an achievable and effective way to alleviate multiple social, economic and environmental challenges.
- Organisations, including businesses, understand and work to Environment (Wales) Act, SMNR, SoNaRR report, Natural Resources Policy and Planning Policy Wales.
- Community organisations are enabled to drive change in their area, to ensure nature is something that can be accessed and appreciated by all.







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Disablers

Achieving this goal is **less likely to happen** when...

- Environmental grants are reduced and restrictive and short-term.
- Economic growth, including jobs and business, are prioritised over the natural environment, with environmental damage trade-off for short-term growth.
- Failure to plan, design and manage green infrastructure from the start of programmes and projects.
- A focus on waste, transport and energy, away from the natural environment.
- Lack of knowledge Green Infrastructure is seen as the role of environment department.

Defining the issue

The global population is expected to reach 8 billion by 2030, with 3 billion new consumers, placing an ever-increasing pressure on our natural resources. State of Natural Resources Report explores whether we are using and managing natural resources sustainably. Natural resources are continuously declining or are being used faster than can be replenished. We need a system where waste and resource use are minimised, and when a product reaches the end of its life, it is able to be used again to create further value. Sustainable systems can also bring economic benefits; contributing to innovation, growth and job creation.

Wales faces many challenges today; securing energy and fuel supply, creating jobs and income, tackling poverty and inequality, reducing the threats of climate change and flooding, and improving people's health and well-being. In meeting these challenges we need to understand how we maintain, improve and use our natural resources.

Making **Simple** Changes



Adopt a single-use plastic policy (to remove single-use plastics from your estate).

Reduce the environmental impact of events for example by not using balloons, providing recycling facilities, raising awareness to attendees through art/cultural activities.

Ensure vou have facilities

for recycling across your organisation.

Source reused/recycled items

across your estate (furniture, stationery, electronics, paint, flooring etc.) using local social enterprise suppliers where possible. Request zero plastic & polystyrene packaging.

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Making Simple Changes

Support community repair cafes and zero-waste community initiatives.

Ensure your canteens, venues and events label the source of food - for example sustainable fish, local, organic, Fairtrade.

When holding events and

conferences, book local venues and suppliers that procure sustainable/local/ethical food and don't use single-use plastics. **Include nature** in your organisation's Environment Policy (or other relevant policy)

Evaluate tender responses on not only cost and quality, but also response to social, environmental and cultural questions; and weight decisions accordingly.

Increase access to mains water refilling stations (free of charge) on your estate.

5: Using Natural Resources



Being More Adventurous

Reduce all plastic products and packaging that you use; if its use is unavoidable, choose plastic that is reusable, recyclable and with recycled content where technically possible.

In Temporary Event Notices

make it a condition to only allow compostable/locally recyclable food packaging.

Ban balloon and sky lantern

releases on all your land and land you work with whilst promoting other artistic alternatives.

Carry out a Waste Audit of your organisation.

Develop forums to enable the sharing of furniture, stock and stationery between departments and organisations or donate unwanted items to charities to avoid the purchase of new products that use more raw materials.

Work with local suppliers and farmers to source local, healthy, sustainable food delivered to work premises.



Take actions to reduce food waste from canteens, venues and food premises; monitor, report on and promote what you are doing.

Work with others to provide educational materials and appropriate facilities to help businesses, people and staff to easily understand how to reuse, compost or recycle new materials, such as plant-based plastics.

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Being More Adventurous

Provide Reverse Vending Machines for use in your buildings.

Ensure environmental, social and cultural commitments are detailed as conditions in contracts and monitor the delivery of these.

Install mains Water Refill stations in commonly used areas to make water more visible and accessible for your staff and people you work with.

Owning your Ambition

Collaborative or national actions

Support the innovation and commercialisation of new products, processes and services by local businesses through purchasing.

Develop initiatives that aim to re-use and re-process products to support a circular economy.

Organisational actions

Your organisation is 100% single-use plastic free and a zero-waste organisation.

Ensure your choices about the use of material resources are based on making the most appropriate and sustainable use of finite resources and promoting the principles of a circular economy.

Source markets for new materials, such as plantbased packaging, so that they can be included in household recycling collections.
